JUNIOR HIGH

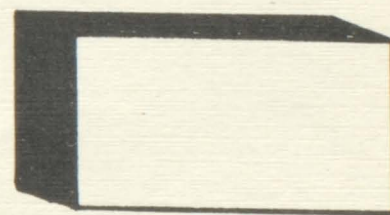
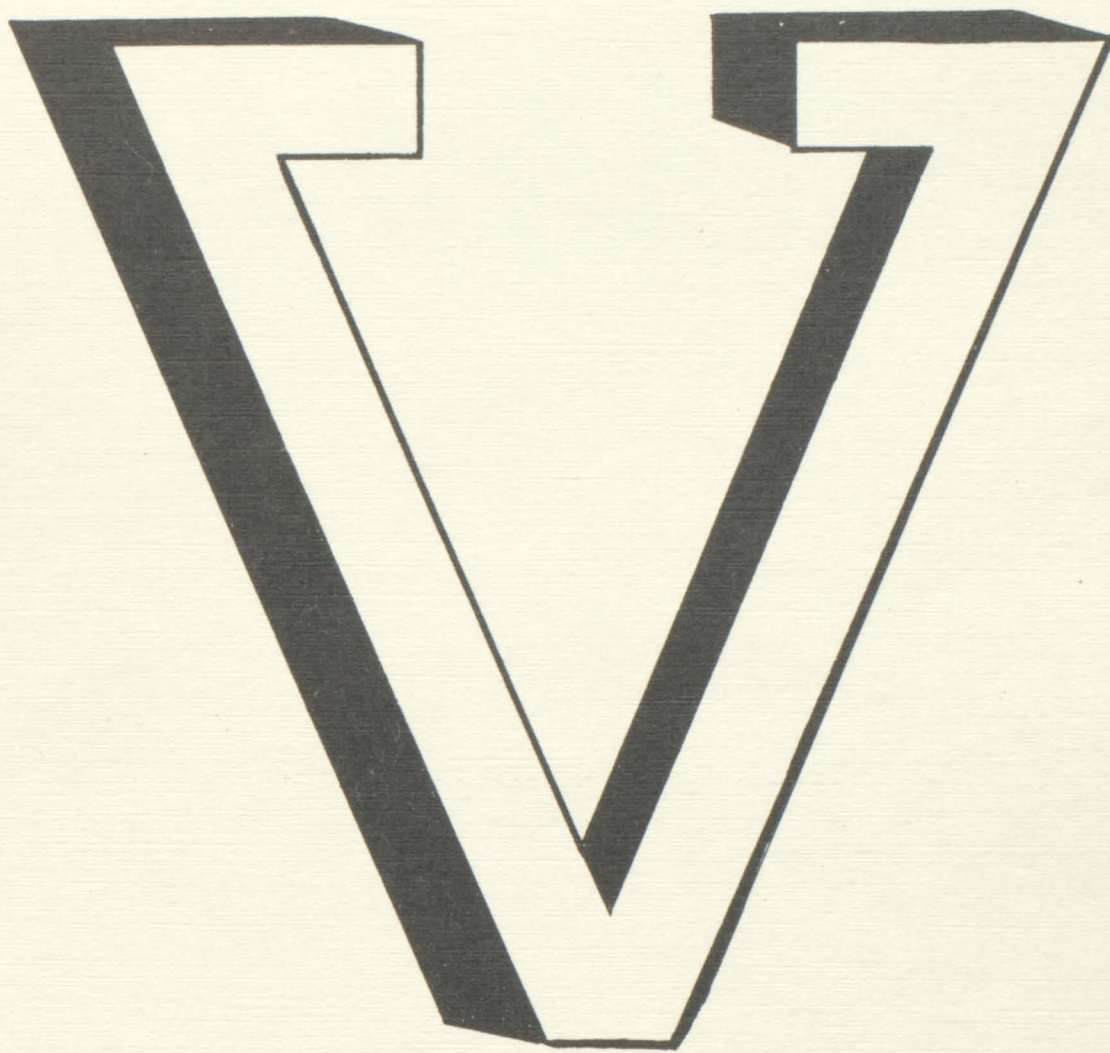
THE SUTHERLAND JUNIOR HIGH WITH AN ENROLLMENT OF 58 STUDENTS PLAYED A VERY IMPORTANT ROLL IN THE SCHOOL LIFE OF THE PAST YEAR. THERE WERE NINE THAT PLAYED IN THE SCHOOL BAND AND TWENTY-SIX THAT SANG IN THE JUNIOR HIGH CHORUS. THIS MUSICAL ORGANIZATION RECEIVED MUCH PRAISE FOR ITS FINE WORK IN THE CHRISTMAS PROGRAM AND THE SPRING FESTIVAL.

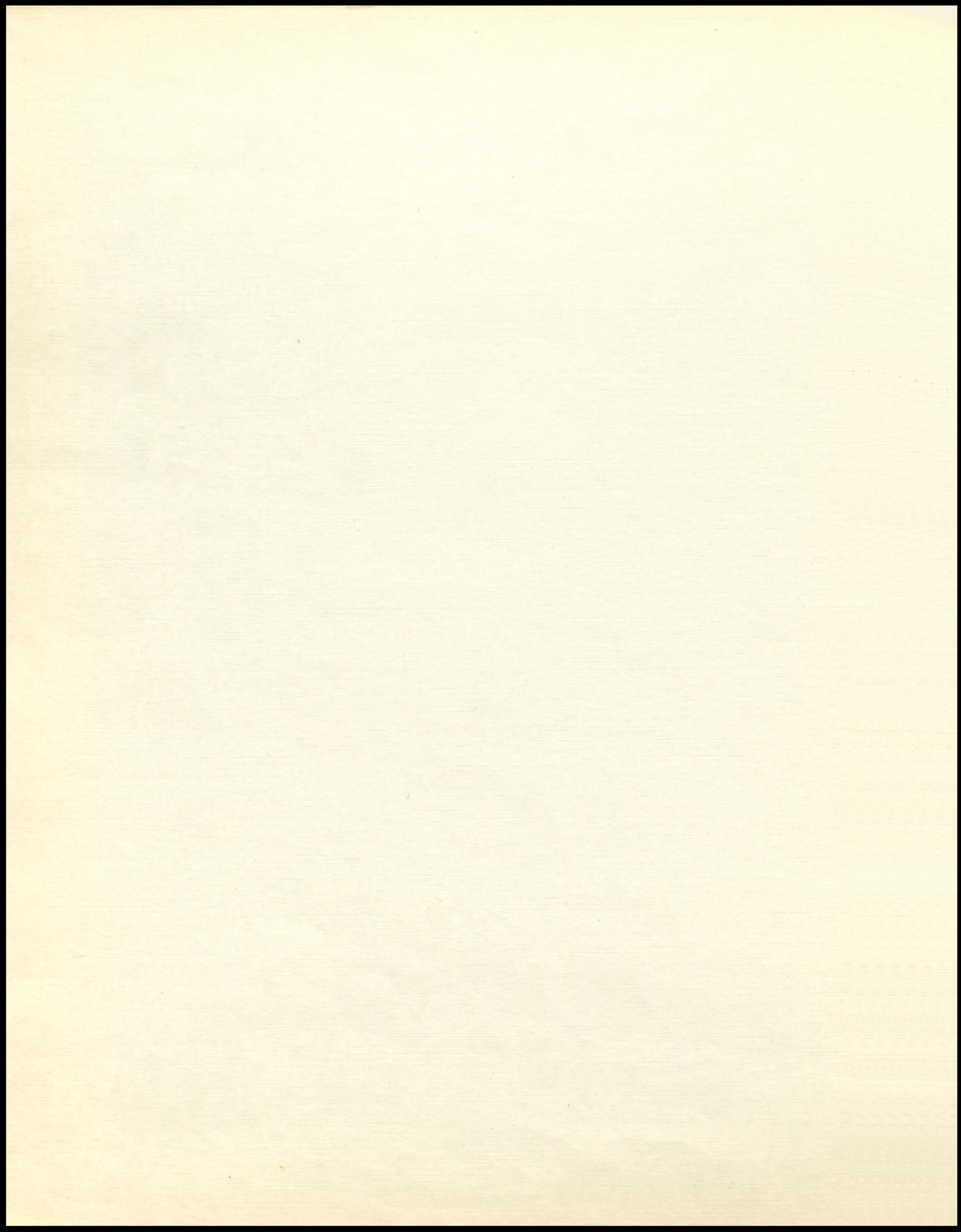
A THREE GAME FOOTBALL SCHEDULE WAS PLAYED BY THE JUNIOR HIGH TEAM WITH TWO WINS AND ONE LOSE. HARTLEY WON BY A SCORE OF 13 TO 7 AT HARTLEY AND LOST ON THEIR RETURN GAME BY A SCORE OF 25 TO 13. THE "PUPS" FINISHED THE SCHEDULE BY DEFEATING THE LOCAL FRESHIES 7 TO 6.

THE ART CLASS CONTRIBUTED MUCH IN MAKING POSTERS FOR HOMECOMING, JUNIOR CLASS PLAY AND THE COMMUNITY SCRAP DRIVE.

JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL BASKETBALL TEAM

FOOTBALL

PROSPECTS WERE BRIGHT THIS YEAR ALTHOUGH ONLY TWENTY-TWO REPORTED FOR PRACTICE. THEY WERE PAUL SWEENEY, LUVERNE NIELSEN, PAUL JENSEN, RONNIE GILLESPIE, DICK LONG, BURDETTE WAGGONER, VERNON SELK, MERWIN ANDERS, TOM DOLING, DONALD SIMPSON, CLARENCE SHERIDAN, ROY HANLON, NED HILL, LEONARD BRANSTETTER, PHIL HOFFMAN, DELBERT MARTIN, VERNON EBEL, GLEN WAGGONER, HOWARD HOCKERT, WILBUR MARTIN, BOB REGINETTER, AND DEAN SIMPSON.

BECAUSE OF THE WAR AND SCARCITY OF TIRES THERE WAS NO SIOUX VALLEY CONFERENCE JAMBOREE.

THE FOLLOWING WEEK THE TIGERS STARTED AN EIGHT GAME SCHEDULE BY DEFEATING PETERSON 21-2. NIELSEN SHOWED REMARKABLE DRIVE ALL DURING THE GAME.

THE NEXT GAME FOR THE TIGERS WAS WITH CLEGHORN. THIS WAS THE FIRST SIOUX VALLEY CONFERENCE GAME FOR THE TIGERS. THIS PROVED TO BE QUITE A BATTLE. THE SCORE AT THE HALF WAS SUTHERLAND 7, CLEGHORN 6. SUTHERLAND WON THE GAME 14-12.

SANBORN FORFEITED TO SUTHERLAND FOR THE NEXT GAME. IN PLACE OF SANBORN THE TIGERS PLAYED ALTON'S PAROCHIAL SCHOOL. SUTHERLAND SCORED IN THE FIRST QUARTER ON SEVERAL POWER PLAYS. ALTON SCORED ON A PASS. THE HALF SCORE READ, SUTHERLAND 7, ALTON 6. SUTHERLAND WON 14-12.

SUTHERLAND WITH HIGH HOPES OF A FOURTH VICTORY ROLLED OVER A LARGE HARTLEY TEAM 21-7. LED BY "DUTCH" NIELSEN THE TIGERS SCORED EASILY IN THE FIRST AND SECOND QUARTER. SUTHERLAND LEAD AT THE HALF 14-0. NIELSEN WAS HURT AT THE END OF THE SECOND QUARTER. SUTHERLAND SCORED AGAIN IN THE TWO REMAINING PERIODS. HARTLEY'S SCORE GAME IN THE LAST QUARTER ON A PASS.

SUTHERLAND DIDN'T GET WARMED UP IN THE PRIMGHAR GAME AND, WITH THE ABSENCE OF NIELSEN, DIDN'T SEEM TO HAVE THE OLD TIGER SPIRIT. PRIMGHAR WON 26-6.

ANOTHER OFF NIGHT FOR SUTHERLAND. ALTA BEAT THE TIGERS 13-7. NIELSEN WAS ALSO ABSENT IN THIS GAME. SUTHERLAND DIDN'T HAVE THE OLD DRIVE AS THEY DID IN THE FIRST FOUR GAMES OF THE SEASON.

THE NEXT GAME WAS THE OLD GRUDGE WITH PAULLINA. SUTHERLAND RECEIVED THE KICKOFF AND WENT DOWN THE FIELD FOR A TOUCHDOWN IN THE FIRST FOUR MINUTES OF PLAY. SCORE AT THE HALF; SUTHERLAND 7, PAULLINA 0. IN THE THIRD QUARTER PAULLINA SCORED ON A PASS AND ALSO CONVERTED. THE SCORE WAS THEN TIED. AGAIN PAULLINA SCORED ON A PASS. PAULLINA 14, SUTHERLAND 7.

SIOUX RAPIDS CANCELLED THEIR GAME BECAUSE OF LACK OF MEN. IN PLACE OF SIOUX RAPIDS THE TIGERS PLAYED LINN GROVE. THE LONE TOUCHDOWN OF THE GAME CAME WHEN A LINN GROVE PLAYER INTERCEPTED A PASS AND SCORED. LINN GROVE WON 7-0.

SUTHERLAND WAS WELL REPRESENTED ON THE ALL-CONFERENCE TEAM. PAUL SWEENEY ON THE FIRST TEAM AND LUVERNE NIELSEN, CLARENCE SHERDIAN ON THE SECOND TEAM.

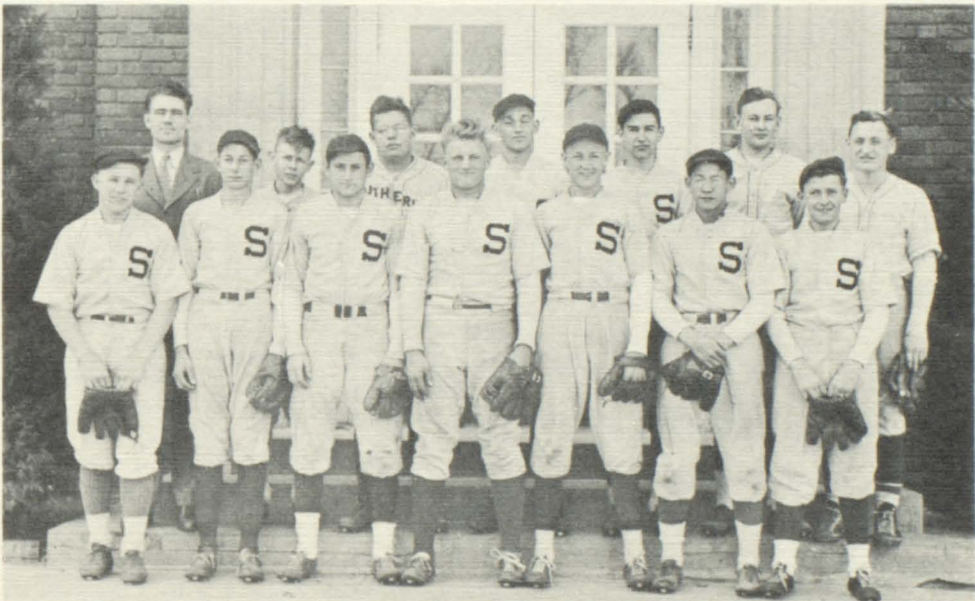
THE SQUAD ELECTED PAUL SWEENEY AS CAPTAIN AND LUVERNE NIELSEN AS MOST VALUABLE.

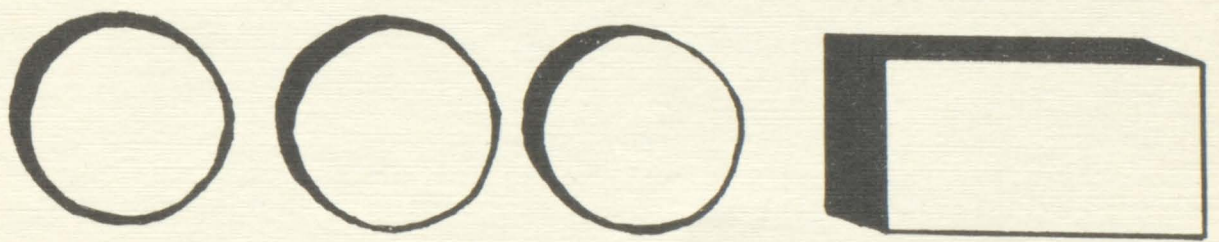
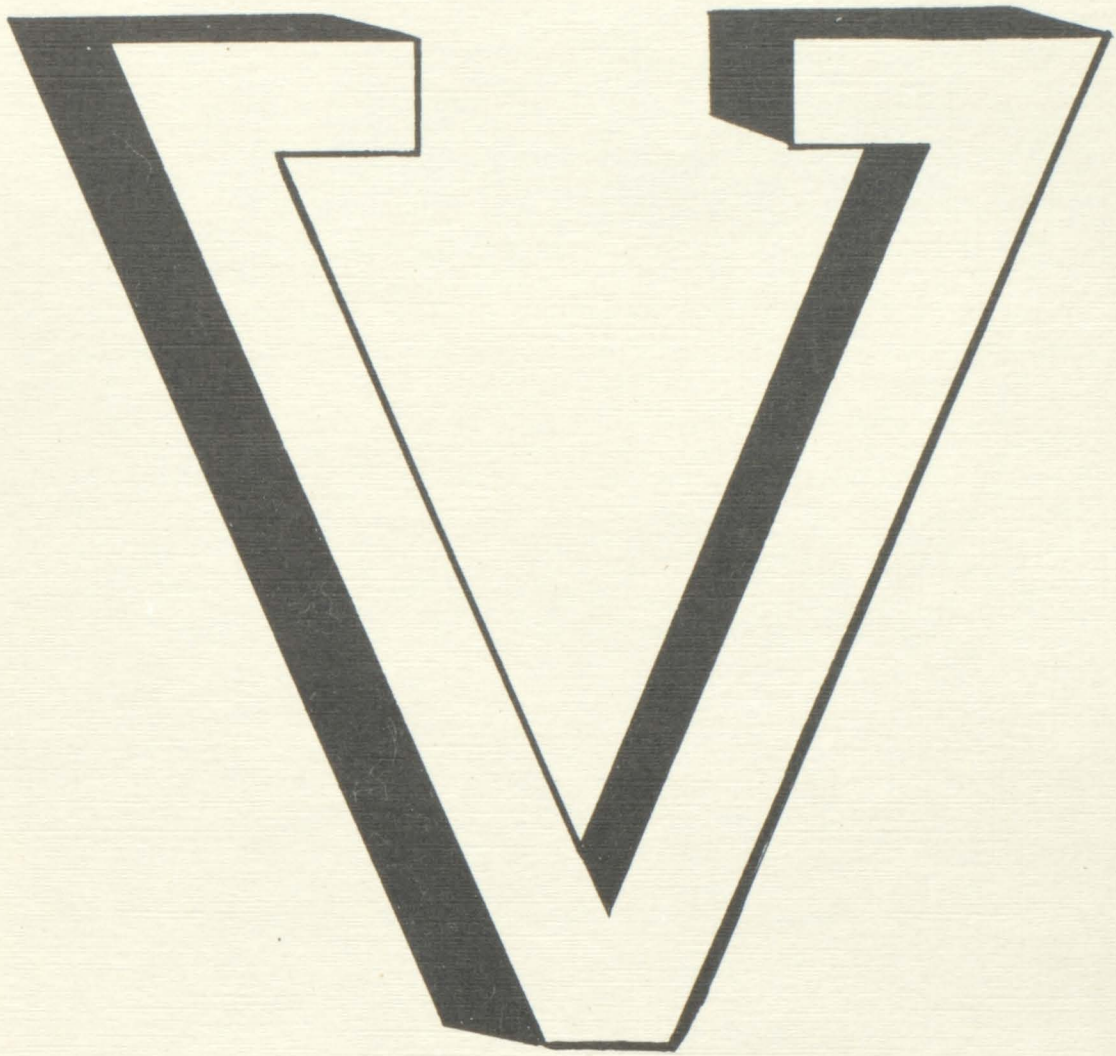
GIRLS' "S" CLUB

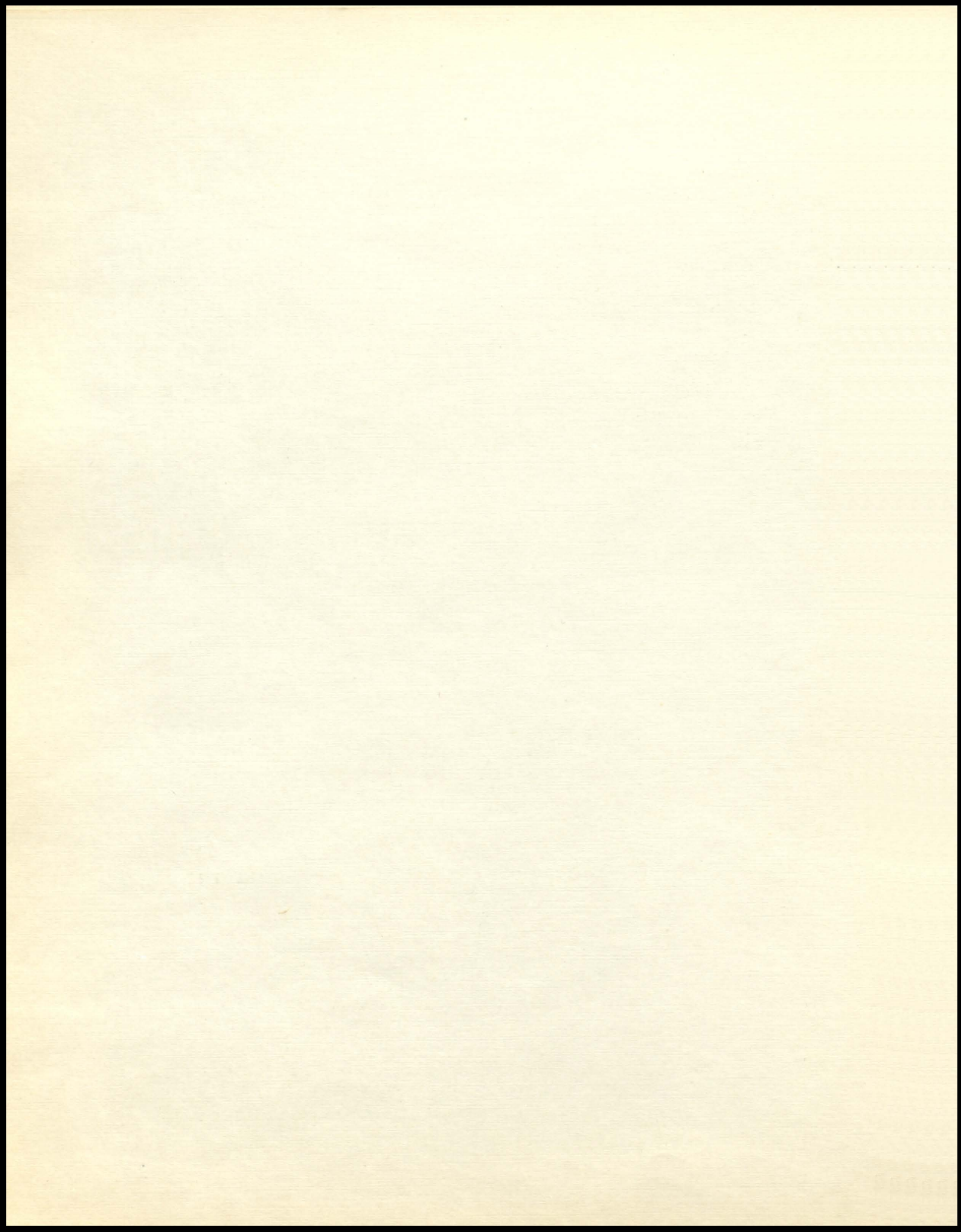

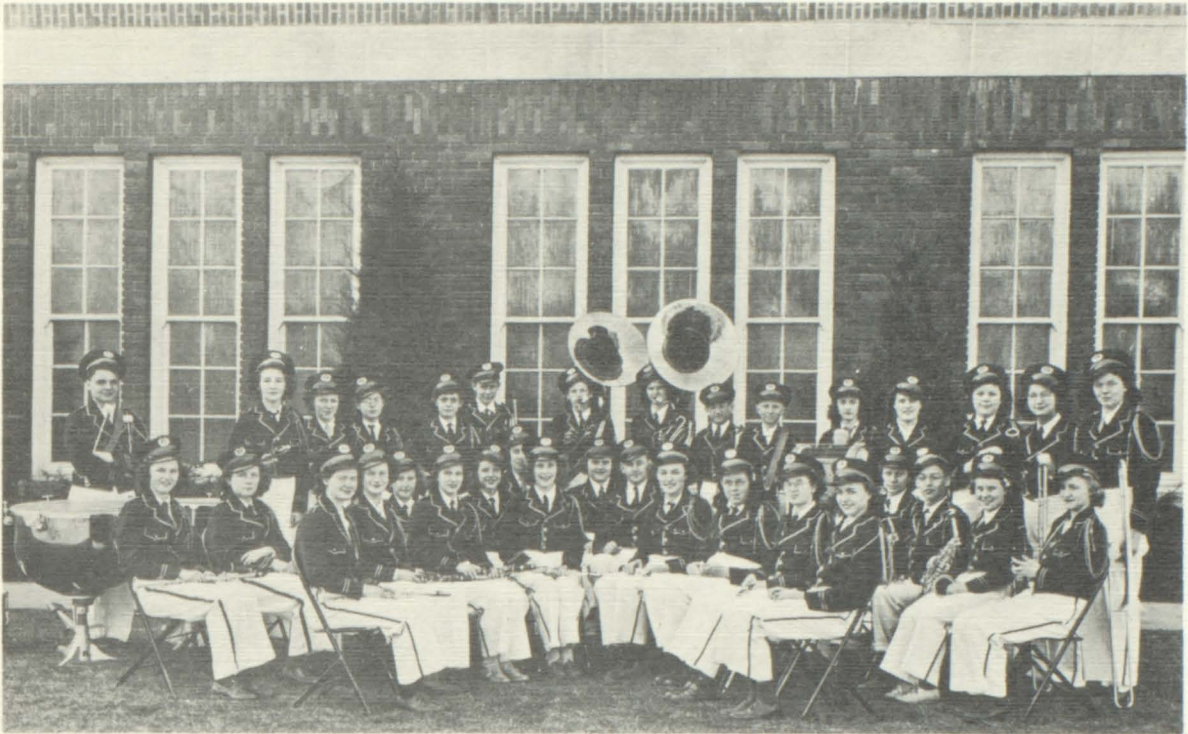

VISUAL EDUCATION

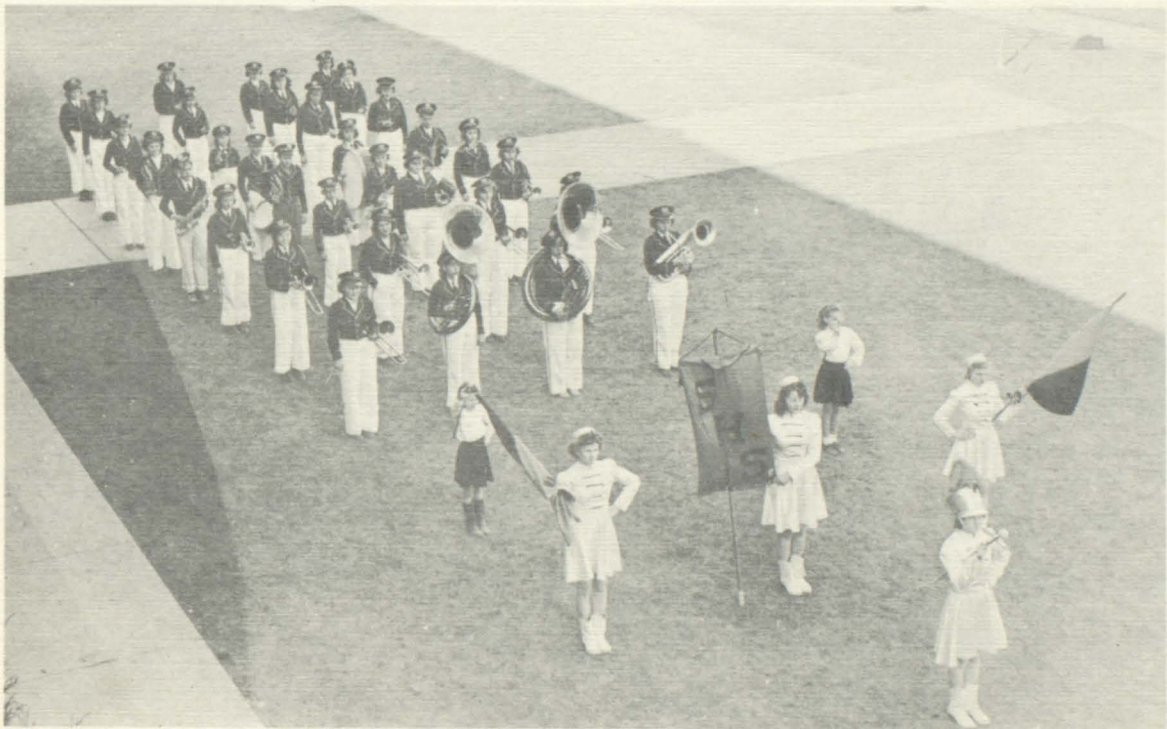

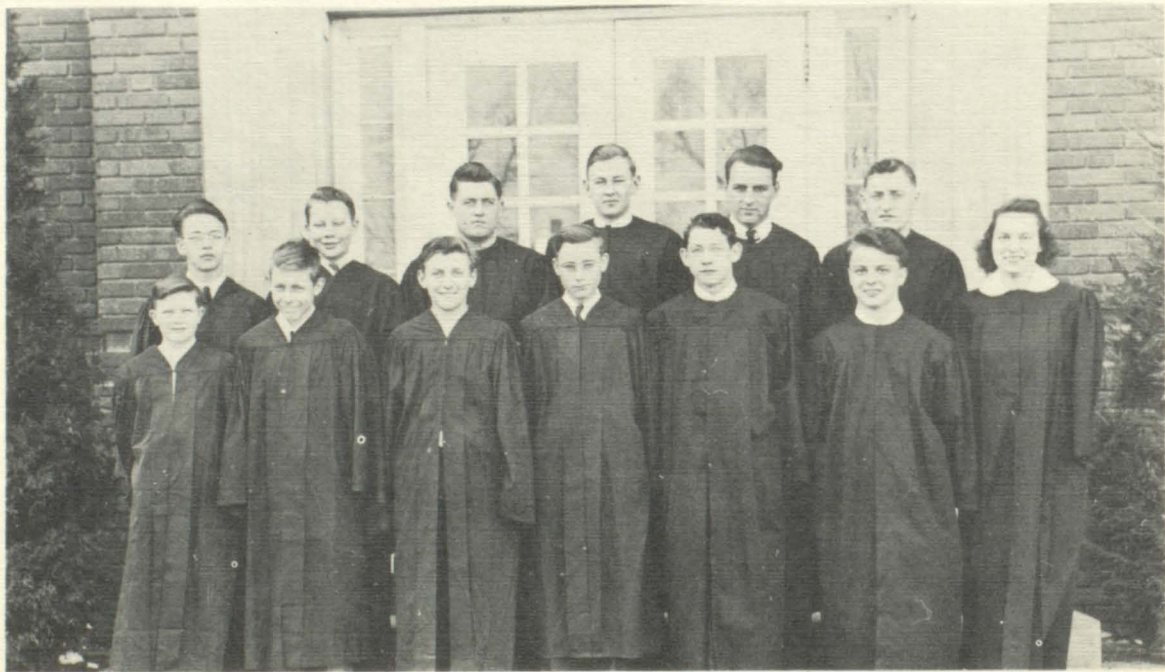

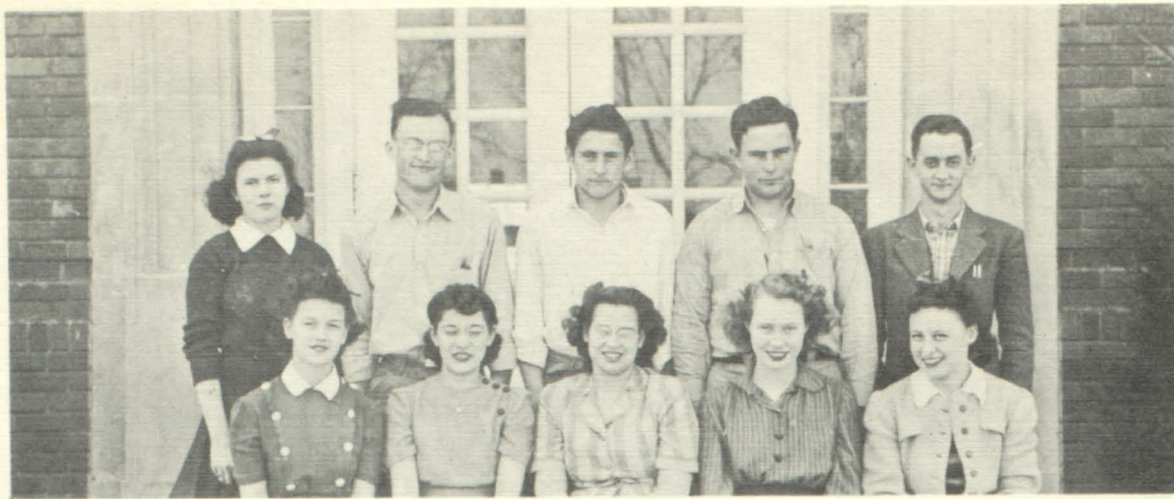
JUNIOR-SENIOR BANQUET
