S.H.S.'s NEW COACH, EVERETT BROWER, AND HIS FIGHTING TIGERS OPENED THE 1946 FOOTBALL SEASON ONE WEEK BEFORE SCHOOL STARTED. ON THE FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL THE TIGERS WERE OUT IN FULL STRENGTH WITH TWENTY-THREE PLAYERS REPORTING. OF THESE, EIGHT WERE LETTERMEN AND WERE AS FOLLOWS: SENIORS-ZAHRENS, BRYANT, G. HILL, THIESSEN; JUNIORS-MARTINSON, R. HILL, JENSEN, SOPHOMORES-J. TRIPLETT, RECKOFF. THOSE HAVING SEEN ACTION IN PREVIOUS YEARS BUT NOT QUITE ENOUGH TO BE QUALIFIED FOR LETTERS WERE: GERRARD, FLINDERS, MCCORMACK, ELSBURY AND ENGELKE. PLAYERS OUT FOR THE FIRST TIME WERE: JEFFRIES, ROHWER, HAMBROCK, ROGER NEGUS, ROBERT NEGUS, SCHIMMER, T. DRAKE, MILLER, AND CARNAHAN. TWO LETTERMEN, CHESLEY AND C. TRIPLETT, WERE NOT ABLE TO START THE SEASON BECAUSE OF INJURIES BUT WERE BACK IN ACTION AS THE SEASON WAS GETTING UNDER WAY. THE TIGERS FACED A TOUGH SCHEDULE OF FIVE CONFERENCE GAMES AND THREE NONCONFERENCE GAMES.





## SUTHERLAND 32 - PETERSON O


THE TIGERS GOT UNDER WAY IN THE 1946 FOOTBALL SEASON BY DEFEATING THE PETERSON ELEVEN 32-0 AT PETERSON IN A NON-CONFERENCE GAME. THE TIGERS SCORED IN THE FIRST AND SECOND QUARTERS, AND AT THE HALF THE SCORE STOOD, SUTHERLAND-13 PETERSON-O. COACH BROWER'S TIGERS CAME OUT FIGHTING IN THE SECOND HALF AND HIT. HARD AND FAST FOR THREE MORE MARKERS. SUTHERLAND LOOKED GOOD ON OFFENSE AND NEVER ALLOWED PETERSON WITHIN SCORING DISTANCE OF THE "ORANGE AND BLACK" GOAL.

## SUTHERLAND 12 - MILFORD 12

IN THEIR FIRST CONFERENCE GAME OF THE SEASON THE TIGERS SOCKED HORNS WITH A STRONG MILFORD ELEVEN ON THE LOCAL GRIDARON. ON THE FIRST PLAY OF THE GAME FROM THE LINE OF SCRIMMAGE, JENSEN SHOOK LOOSE AND THREADED HIS WAY 55 YARDS FOR THE
FIRST TOUCHDOWN OF THE GAME. IN THE LATTER PART OF THE FIRST
QUARTER JENSEN SPRINTED 40 YARDS TO TALLY AGAIN FOR THE
TIGERS. NEITHER TEAM WAS ABLE TO SCORE IN THE SECOND QUARTER
AND THE SCORE AT THE HALF WAS SUTHERLAND-12, MILFORD-0.
MILFORD CAME BACK STRONG IN THE SECOND HALF AND SMASHED ACROSS
TO PAY DIRT MID-WAY IN THE THIRD QUARTER. THE TIGERS COULD NOT
FIGHTEN THEIR DEFENSE ENOUGH TO WARD OFF A MILFORD ATTACK
EARLY IN THE FOURTH QUARTER AND MILFORD KNOTTED THE SCORE
12-12. WHEN THE FINAL WHISTLE BLEW THE TIGERS WERE FIGHTING
DESPERATELY ON THEIR TWENTY YARD LINE TO STAVE OFF ANOTHER
MILFORD OFFENSIVE.

#### SUTHERLAND 0 - PAULLINA 21

FOR THEIR THIRD GAME OF THE SEASON THE TIGERS WENT TO PAULLINA AND PLAYED THE PANTHERS IN A VIRTUAL DOWNPOUR OF RAIN. THE PANTHERS PROVED TO BE A STRONG AND FAST TEAM BUT THEY FOUND SUTHERLAND NO FUSHOVER. THE PANTHERS SCORED TWO TOUCHDOWNS IN THE FIRST HALF AND THE SCORE AT HALFTIME WAS PAULLINA 14, SUTHERLAND O. COACH BROWER'S TIGERS CAME OUT IN THE SECOND HALF FULL OF FIGHT AND DETERMINATION. OUTSIDE OF THE ONE TOUCHDOWN PAULLINA GOT IN THE SECOND HALF ON A REVERSE, THE TIGERS SMASHED THE PANTHERS TO A STANDSTILL.



## SUTHERLAND 19 - PRIMGHAR O

IN THEIR SECOND CONFERENCE GAME OF THE SEASON THE TIGERS JOURNEYED TO PRIMGHAR AND DEFEATED THE BULLDOGS 19-0. THE GAME WAS PLAYED IN THE RAIN WHICH MADE THE FIELD MUDDY AND SLIPPERY. IN THE FIRST HALF UNABLE TO DO ANY PASSING, AND NOTCHED ONLY ONE TOUCHDOWN. PRIMGHAR WAS UNABLE TO GET WITHSCORING DISTANCE OF THE BROWERMEN'S GOAL, AS THE TIGERS WERE SHOWING UP WELL ON DEFENSIVE PLAY. IN THE SECOND HALF THE TIGERS PUNCHED ACROSS TWO MORE TOUCHDOWNS AND HAD A THIRD CALLED BACK BECAUSE OF A CLIPPING PENALTY. ## SUTHERLAND 27 - SIOUX RAPIDS 18


