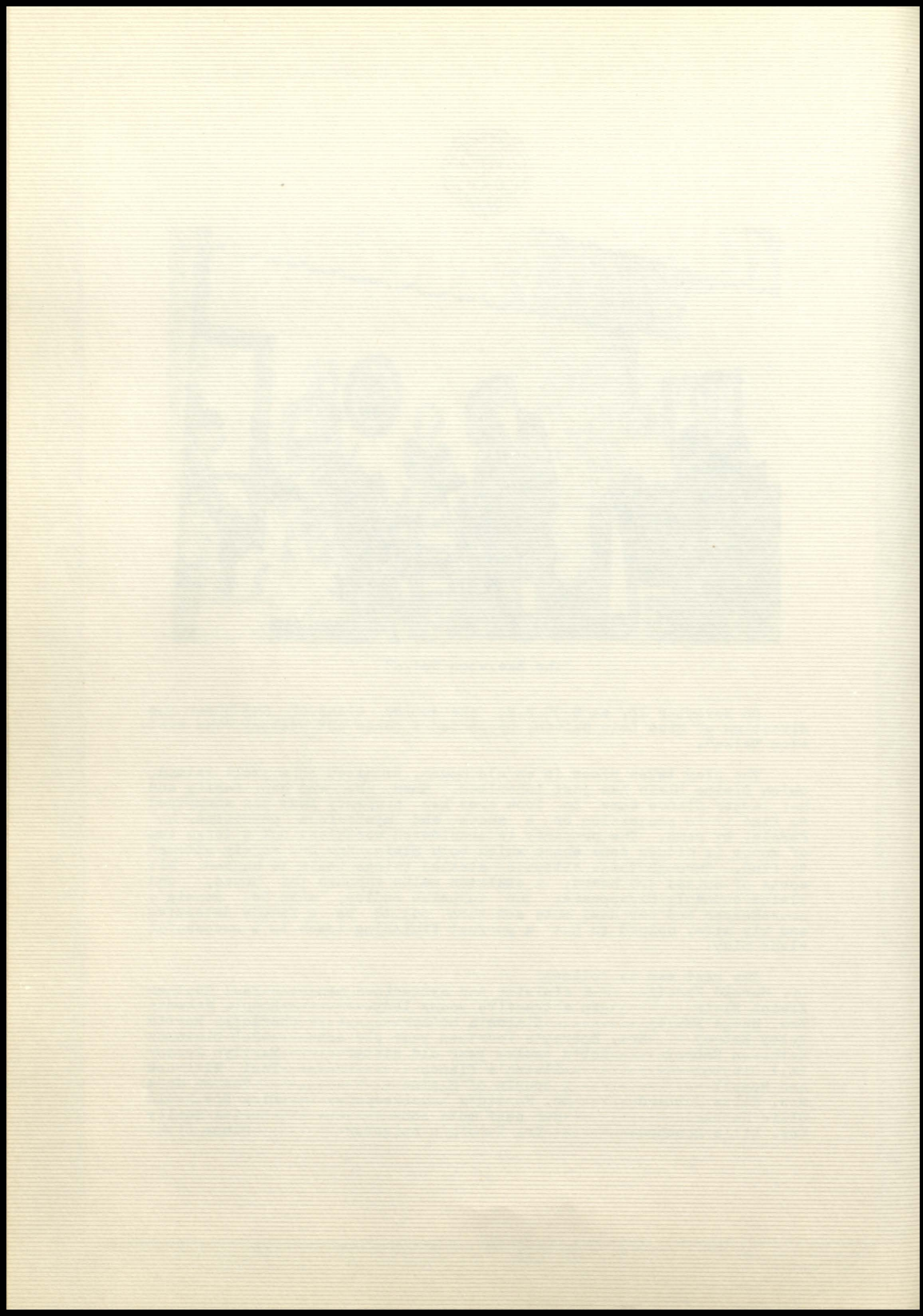
"The Skeleton Walks"

On November 16, at 8:00 P.M. the junior class of SHS under the direction of Miss Lois Galvin, presented a three act mystery, "The Skeleton Walks".

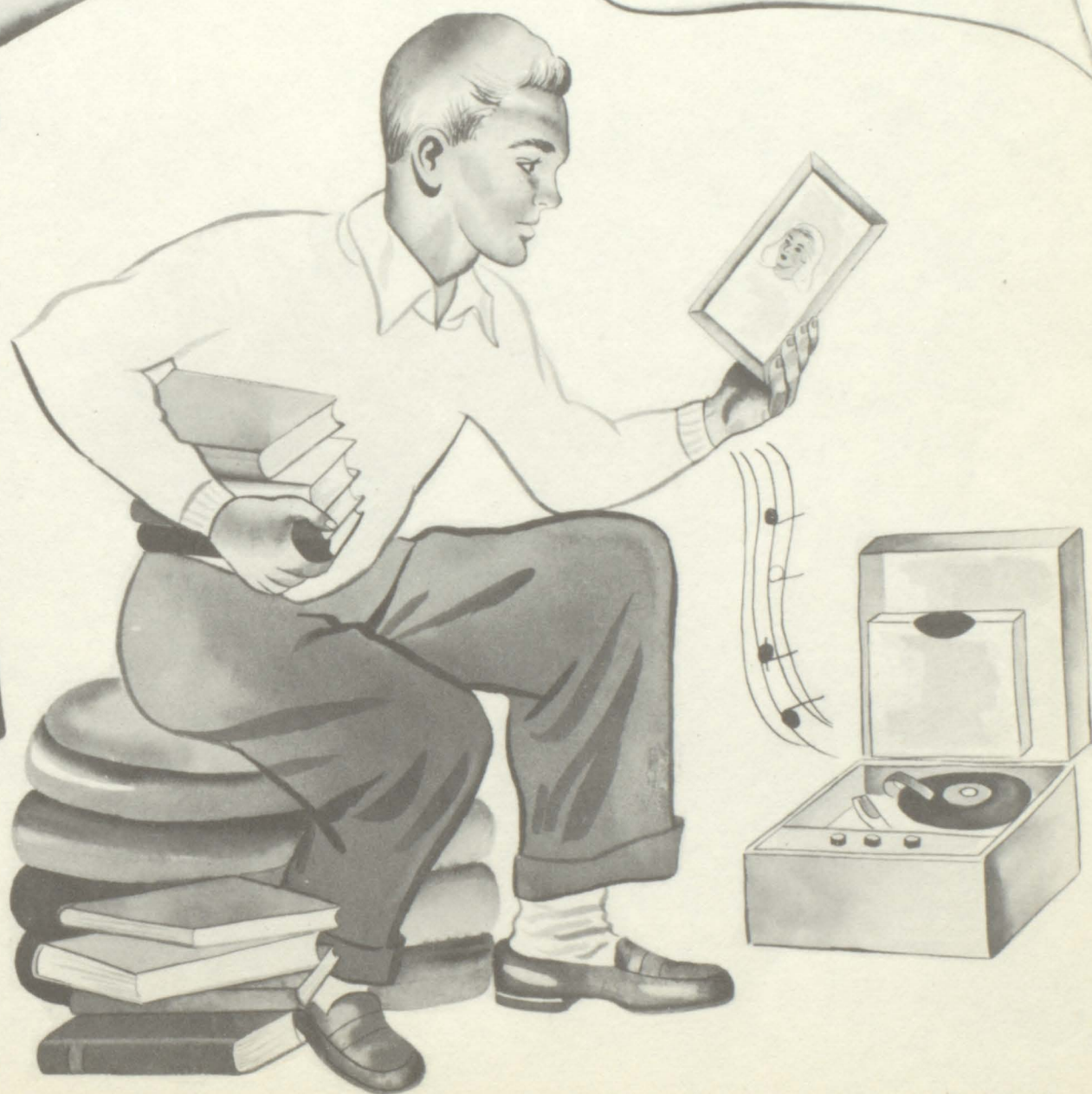

THE 1951 TIGER FOOTBALL SEASON

A workable squad of 26 answered Coach Wickstrom's call for football. The spirit was high and everyone was willing to work. After three weeks of hard practice the Tigers met the Peterson Warhawks in a nonconference game. The game ended in a 13 to 0 victory for the Tigers. The Tigers were inside the 10 yard line four times- only to lose the ball by fumbling.

The next week the Paullina Panthers, co-champions of the Sioux Valley Conference in 1950, swept over the Tigers 32 to 0. Paullina had a hardhitting outfit, and outweighed Sutherland about 20 pounds per man. Paullina scored 4 times in the first half but after the intermission the Tigers held them to one touchdown. Again Sutherland's backs had a severe case of "fumblitis".

The Tigers lost their second conference game to Aurelia. Hindered by the absence of their regular starting halfbacks, Sutherland couldn't fight off Aurelia's heavy line and shifty backs. The score was 14 to 7 at the half. A few freak plays and fumbles by the Tigers put Aurelia ahead 26 to 7, a few minutes after the start of the second half. The final score was 32 to 7.

The Tigers lost a tough game to the Primghar Bulldogs the next week. Sutherland, much improved over the week before, played hard, clean, and heads-up football all the way. After Primghar scored first, the "Wickstrommen" came right back and moved the ball to the Bulldog's five yard line before they were stopped. The first half ended 6 to 0. The second half was a hard fought contest with neither team getting anywhere on offense. The last few minutes of the game told the story when a Primghar back broke loose and scored from about 30 yards out. The game ended 12 to 0. The Tigers felt the loss of Wes Yates, who was sidelined because of an attack of appendicitis.

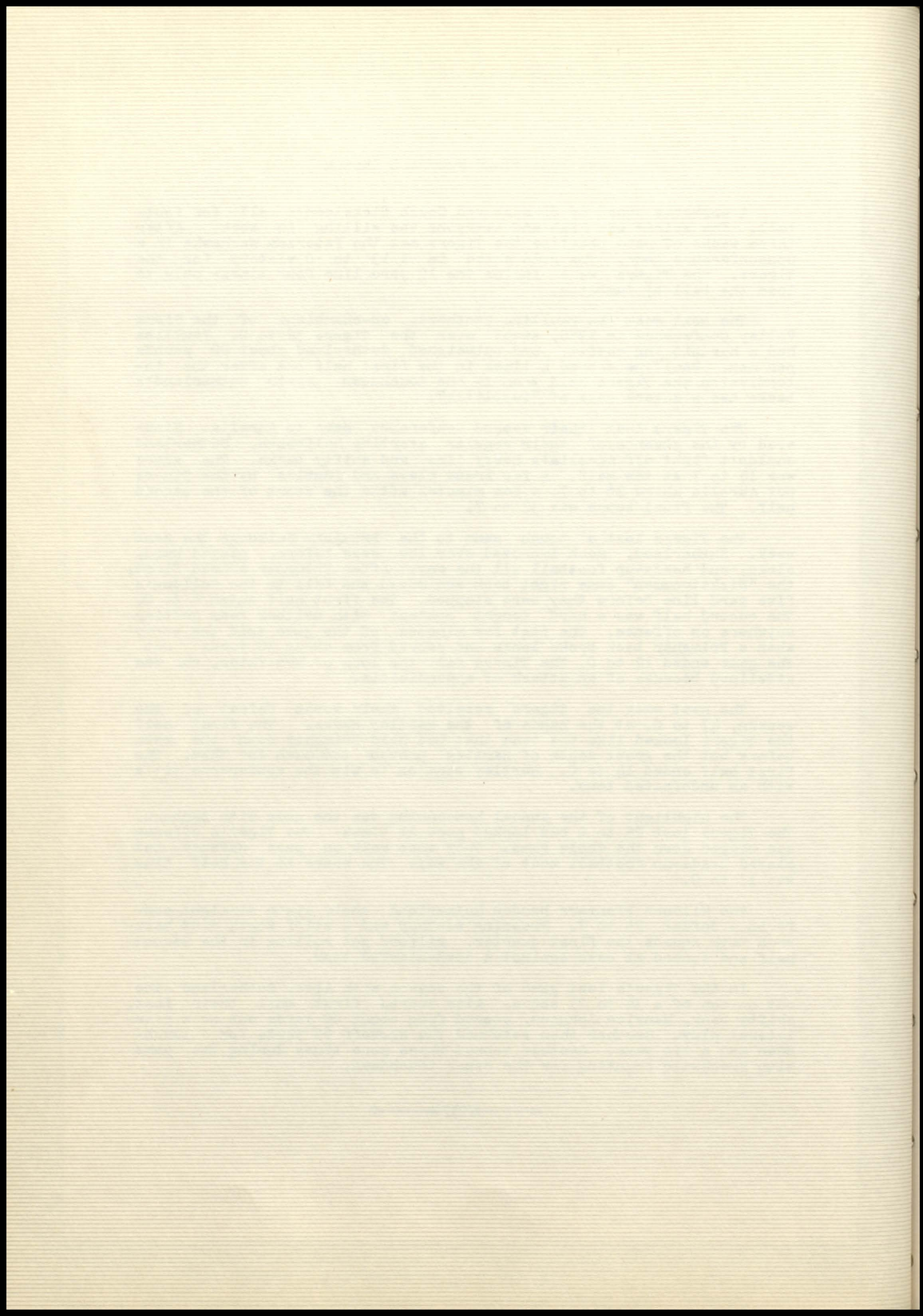
The next week the Tigers received their worst defeat of the season, 47 to 0, at the hands of the Hartley Hawks. The first half the Tigers looked like the team that had held Primghar down the week before but the great depth of Hartley proved too much for them. The first half ended 14 to 0. Hartley went on to win the conference title with an undefeated team.

The highlight of the annual homecoming was the game with Sanborn. The Tigers lost 25 to 0 but looked good at times. The Tiger's offense was bogged down the whole game. They were weak on pass defense, but played heads-up football most of the way. The score at the half time was 13 to 0.

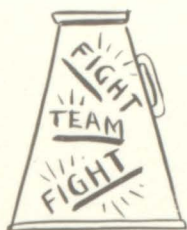
The Milford Pioneers handed Sutherland their sixth straight conference defeat, 25 to 7. Freezing weather and a stiff North wind hampered both squads the first quarter. Milford got rolling in the second half and scored at ease against a down-hearted team.

In the Tiger's last game of the season with Alta, Sutherland came out on top of a 34 to 21 score. Alta scored first when their fast, shifty back, Maurice Johnson, scored from about 60 yards out on a pass-lateral play. Geuther then returned the kickoff 85 yards for a touchdown and a tie game. Geuther scored three more times during the game with Brechwald counting for the other touchdown.

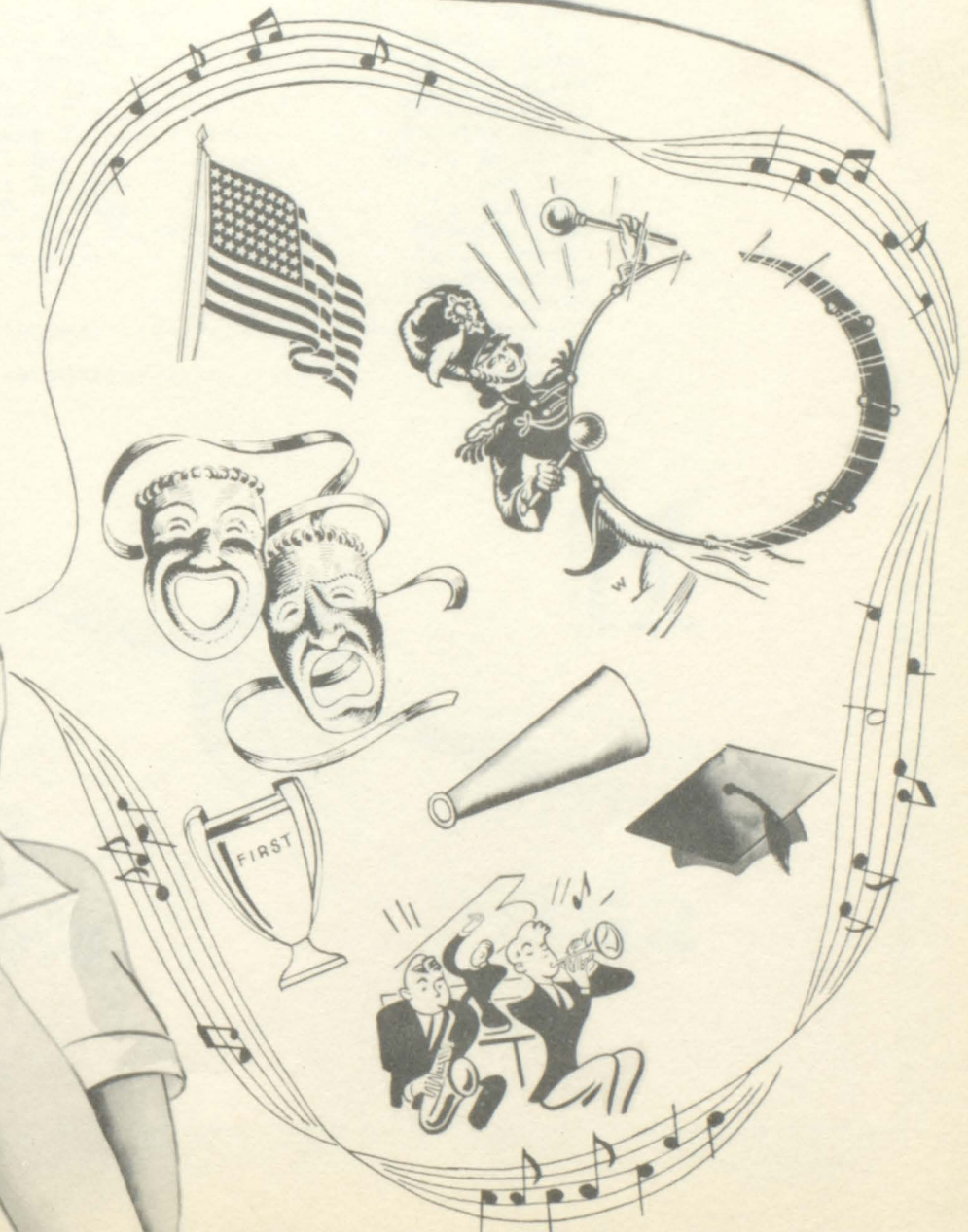


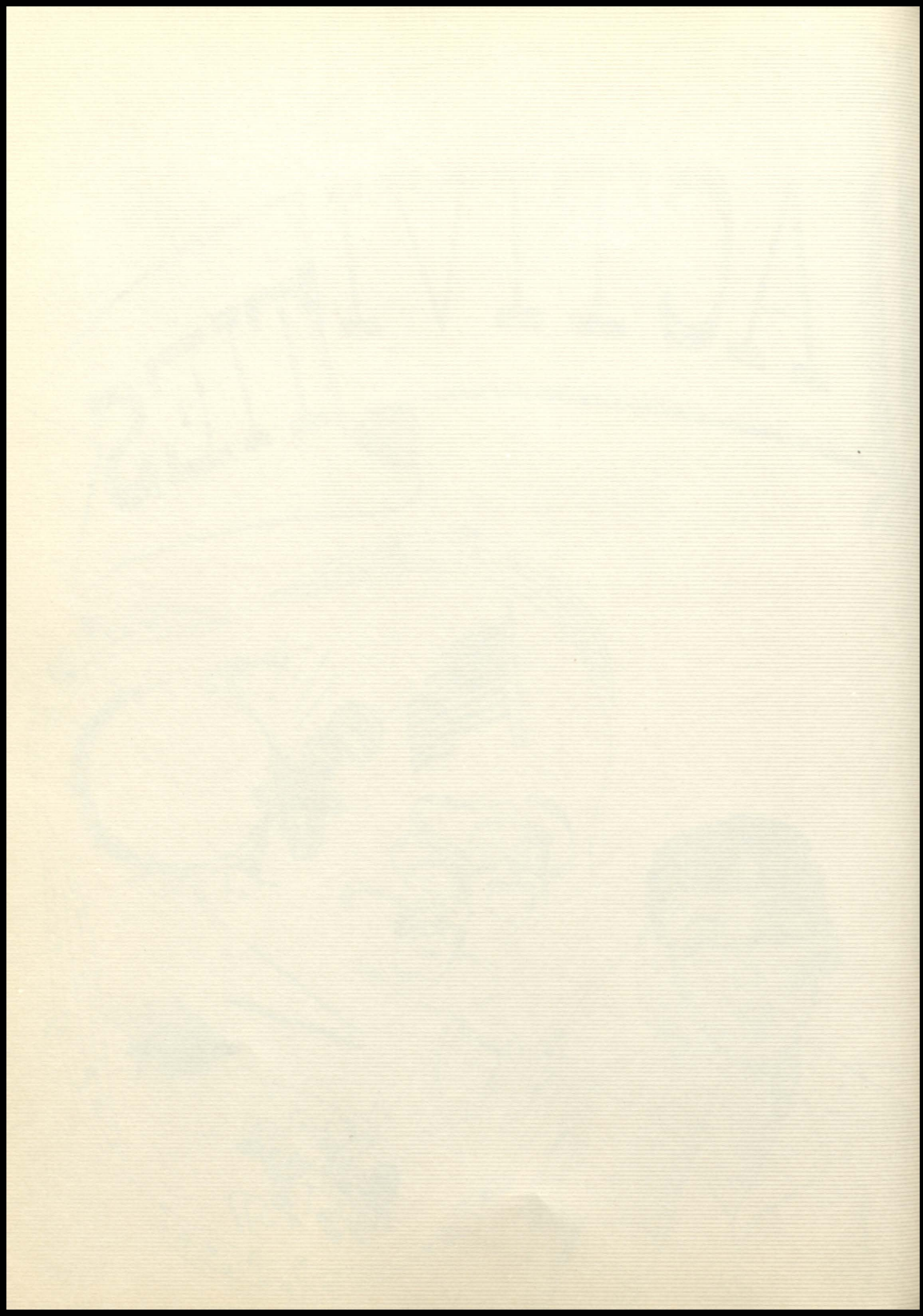
The O'Brien County Tournament was held at Paullina on January 22. Sutherland met Primghar in the first round and was defeated 62-35.

S. H. S. HOMECOMING

The Homecoming festivities of Sutherland High started with a roar on Thursday night, Oct. 18, 1951. The baseball field became a stage and the high school students the players in the traditional "murder scene" with Sanborn the victim of the twenty three fighting Tigers. The bonfire was started promptly at seven o'clock and everyone gathered around the fire. Coach Wickstrom, Supt. Micklick, Mr. Gentry, our band director, Rich Shriver, our game Capt., Jim Chesley, a member of the team, and Carolyn Youde, a high school student, all gave pep talks. The pep band was on hand and played several numbers, and the football players committed the "murder" of the Sanborn team as they threw a Sanborn dummy into the fire. The curtain went down on the 1951 bonfire as the cheerleaders led the fighting yells of S.H.S. A snake dance started at the baseball diamond and ended on main street. The climaxed a night of fun for everyone.

The morning of the 19th. was spent in preparation for the parade in the afternoon. A pep meeting was held in the high school auditorium at 2:30 in the afternoon. Coach Wickstrom gave a pep talk and Rich Shriver gave his views on the forthcoming game. Mr. Bo Heckert gave the Alumni speech and Miss Muriel Frericks, the kindergarten teacher, gave a talk on cheerleading and school spirit. The cheerleaders then led some yells and the pep meeting was climaxed by the singing of the school song, "Fight on for Sutherland".

After the pep meeting, a parade was started toward town. The marching band led the parade and the Queen candidates rode in a convertible following the band. A fire truck carried the cheerleaders and football players. Following the fire truck came the eight floats, and then the grades, walking, and riding bicycles or horses. The band made a circle in the downtown intersection and the parade halted for a few minutes while Mr. Larson, the assistant coach gave a short pep talk, which was followed by a yell from the football squad and the school pep song played by the marching band.

At seven thirty the floats were driven around the football field and the three winning floats were announced. The senior float, "Gliding to Victory", won first prize, the junior float, "Sink Sanborn", won second place, the news staff float and the sophomore float, "Fishing for a Victory", tied for third place. The Commercial Club float, with an alumni football player from each year since 1896 represented, won honorable mention. Mrs. Elmer Baumgarten, Mrs. Ray Olson, and Mrs. Otis Hulser were the float judges.

As the floats went off the field, the band stepped off to a cadence and preceded the Queen candidates who rode in a convertible. When the band completed forming an honorary guard, Tom Triplett, Homecoming King, escorted Arlene Giese, Homecoming Queen, and her attendants to the sidelines where Mr. Vernon Flinders, president of the school board, crowned both the King and Queen. Linda Sue Hoppe and Kenneth Smith were crownbearers. The Queen's attendants were Phyllis Green, Bertha Beermann, Melva Mehrhoff, and Shirley Negus.

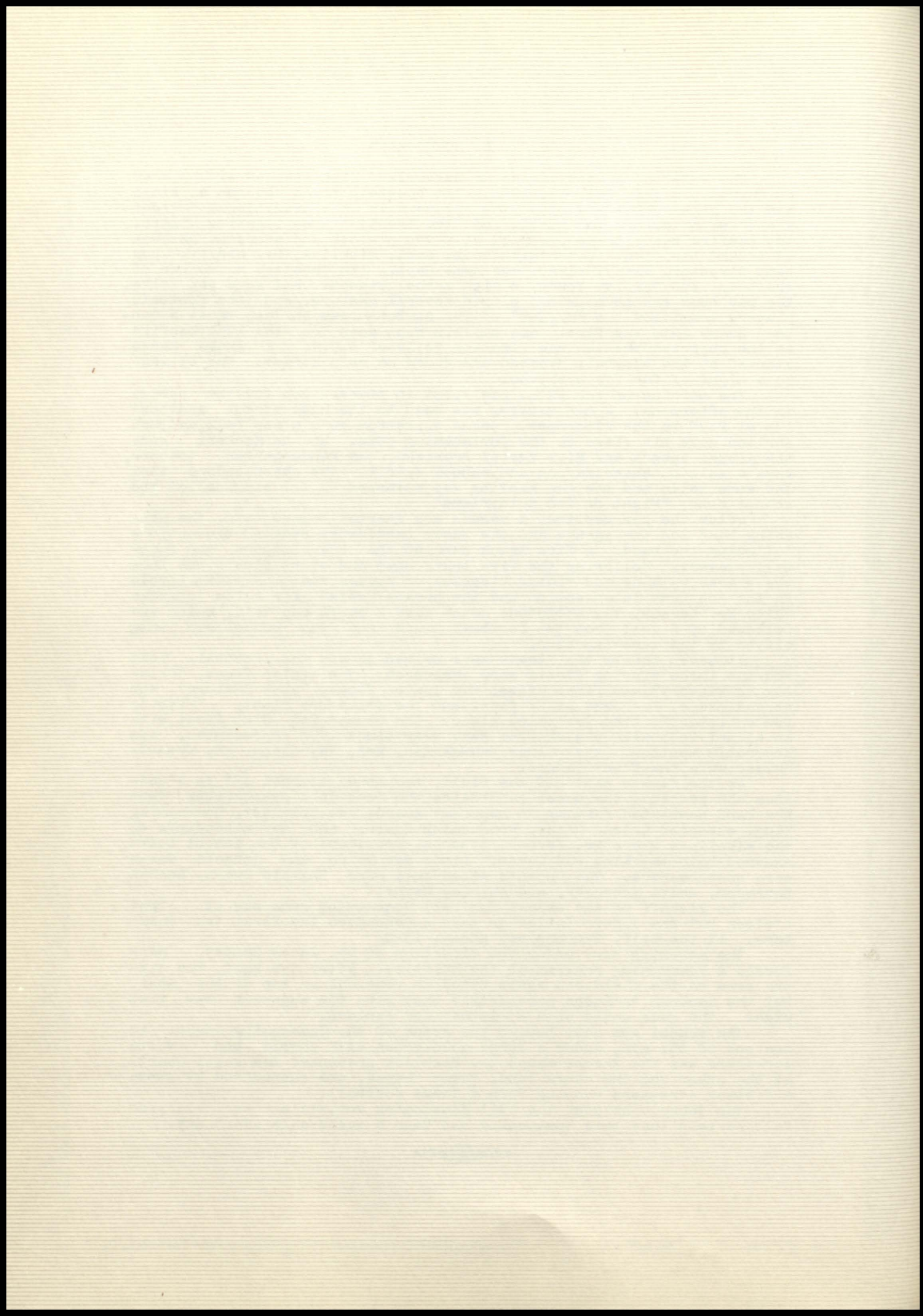
The kickoff of the annual football Homecoming game was at eight o'clock but the Tigers failed to make a touchdown the first two quarters. At the half, Sanborn was ahead, 13-0.

The marching band under the direction of Mr. James Gentry, performed a Homecoming program at the halftime. After the half, the Tigers came on the field and again tried to come out on top of the score but the Sanborn Bulldogs proved that they were the superior team that night. The game ended with a victory for Sanborn.

The school gym next became the scene of the Homecoming dance. At one end of the gym, under a large gold crown with purple and white streamers was the throne where Mr. Micklick presented the Royal Court. At the other end the dance band, Tommy Thomas, was surrounded by orange and black streamers running from a large football.

The dance concluded the 1951 Homecoming activities and everyone felt certain that this Homecoming had been a success in every way.





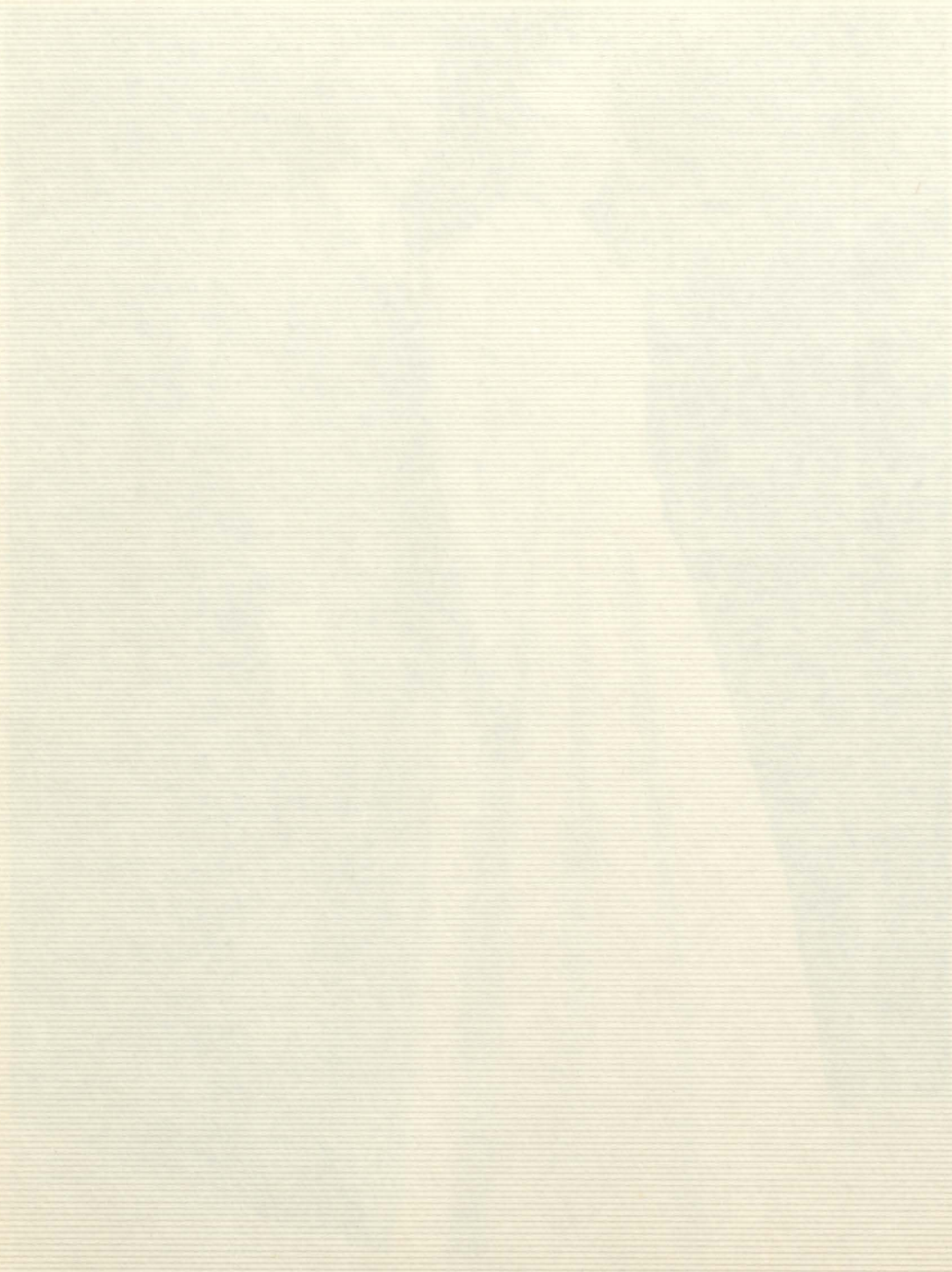
