The drama department performed its fall one-act plays on Wednesday, November 16, at 7:30. This was a busy time of year, but the students did an exceptional job. After several weeks of memorizing and rehearsing, the casts presented three plays which included both comedy and mystery. To begin the entertaining evening was the play "The Terror of the Prairies." This play's cast consisted of Rob Solko as Fletcher, a criminal as tough as a marshmallow; Brent Thorn as Beaumont, Fletcher's partner, who was good hearted and frankly not too bright; Nancy Brown as Chloris Penrose, a twelve-year-old terror of the prairies; Jean Horstmann as Imogene, a young, spunky and slightly dizzy girl; Traci Rohrbaugh as Maisy, Imogene's dizzy friend who waits at crucial moments; Chris Davis as Detective Riley, a stalwart lawman; and Mike Fuhrman as Detective O'Hara, Riley's silent partner. The premise of the play involved the kidnapping of Chloris, which both Beaumont and Fletcher soon came to regret. The second play of the evening was "Nothing in the Telling" by Derek Bowskill. This play's cast was Sheila Kruse as Ann Wood, a pert and imaginative teenager; Laura Rehder as Jean Smedley, Ann's giggly and clever friend; Diana Lange as Martha Quintock, one of the world's greatest helpers and organizers; Deb Frek as Policewoman Jones, a retiring police woman; and Angie DeVall as Miss Vivienne Lafarge, an eccentric woman of an indeterminate age. This play involves mysterious clues to a murder which the inventive Ann finds in a misplaced purse. The last play was a mystery called "The Babysitter", by Laurie Woodward. This play's cast was Marsha Negus as Karen, the babysitter, a responsible and sensitive teenager; Kathy Leonard as Carol, Karen's friend, currently interested in Ouija boards; Lori Rehder as Sarah and Beth Jurgensen as Pam, two other friends of Karen's; and Carol Jolas as Mrs. Williams, a rather confusing woman who has hired Karen to babysit. The action of the last play revolved around the spooky occurrences at a home whose occupants died many years previously. 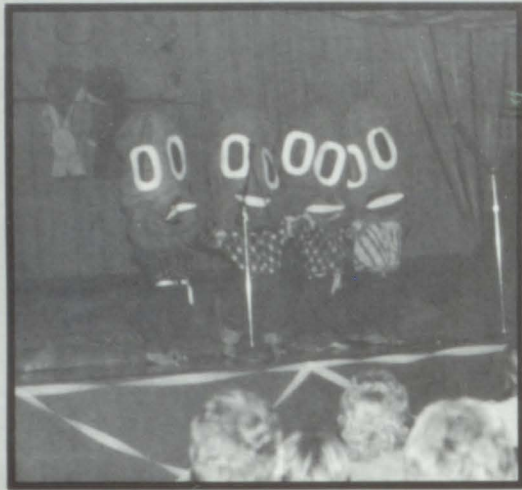

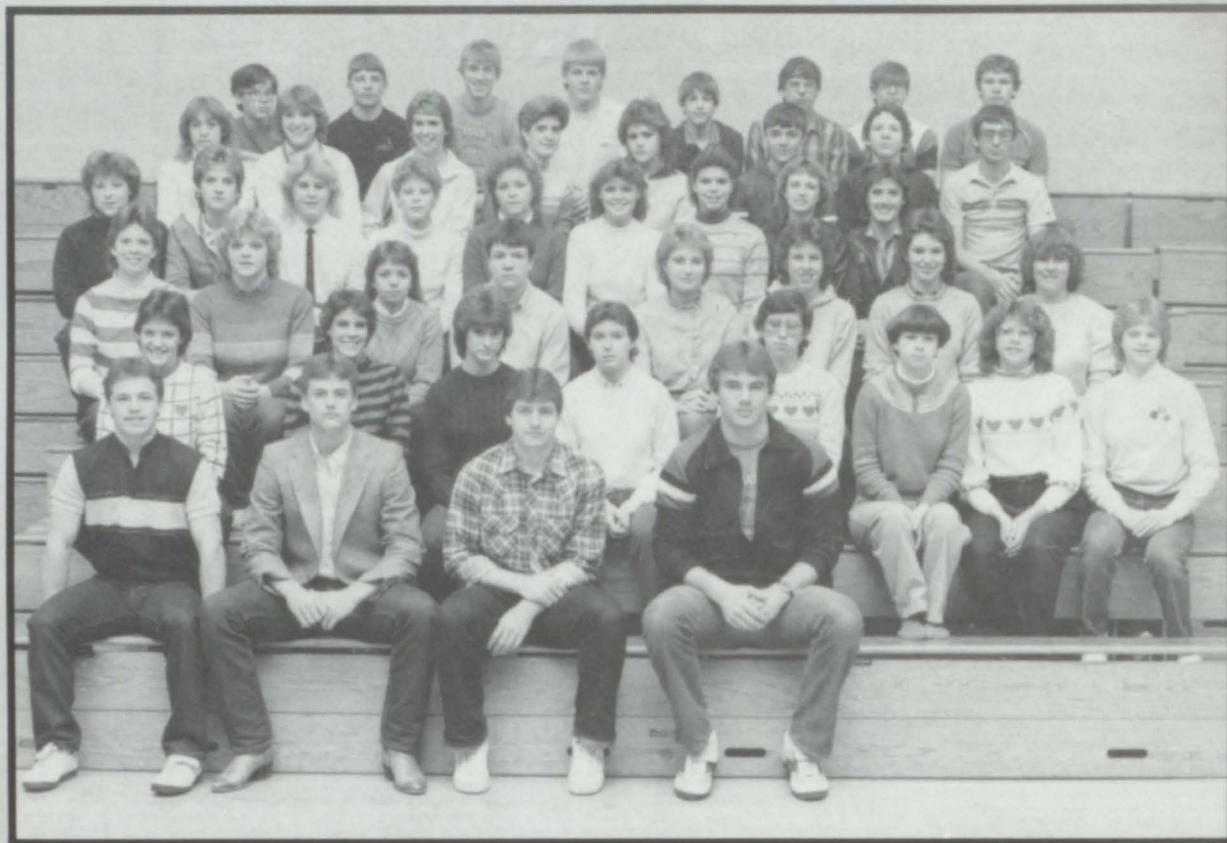
Swing Show—Let's Get Together

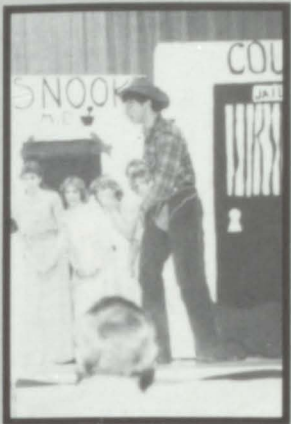

A Rip-Roarin' Good Time

On the evenings of March 30 and 31, the drama and the music departments once again presented the annual Dinner Theater. This year the melodrama was *Tumbleweeds*, a saga about the Old West, which starred Rob Solko as Tumbleweeds himself. The melodrama was a laid-back, fun-filled fantasy about gun-slingers and Indians. The setting for this production was Grimy Gulch, a town where the people were illiterate and where life was tired and slow. Returning to Grimy Gulch after several years' absence was Tumbleweeds, whose intention was to make it a better place to live. However, what he stumbled over was the craftily planned scheme of Trockmorton Fleesum (Trent Amendt) and Clementine Greedy (Marsha Negus). Winning In The Final Seconds

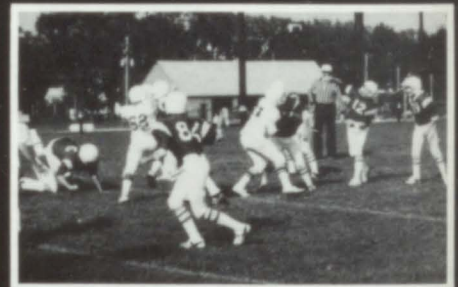

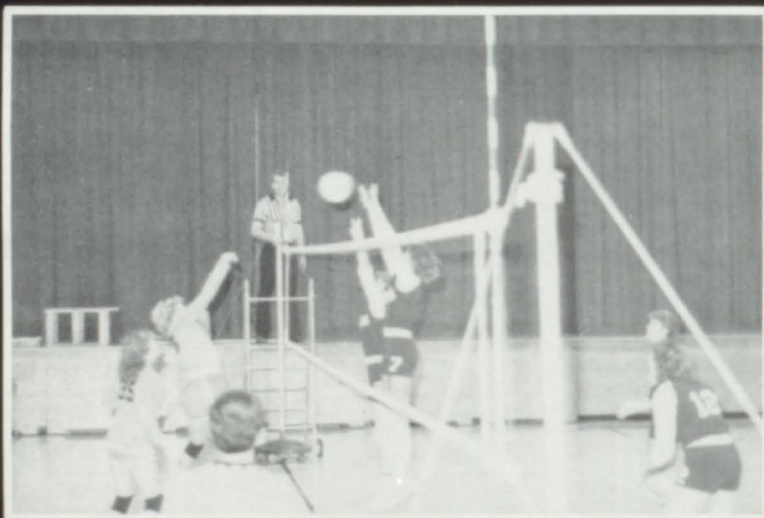

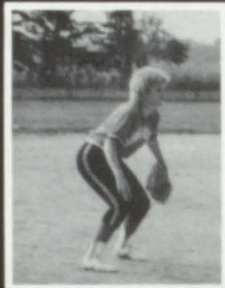


Baseball—Keeping In Step

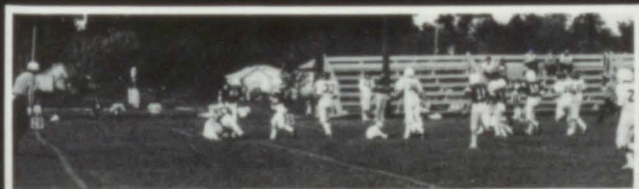
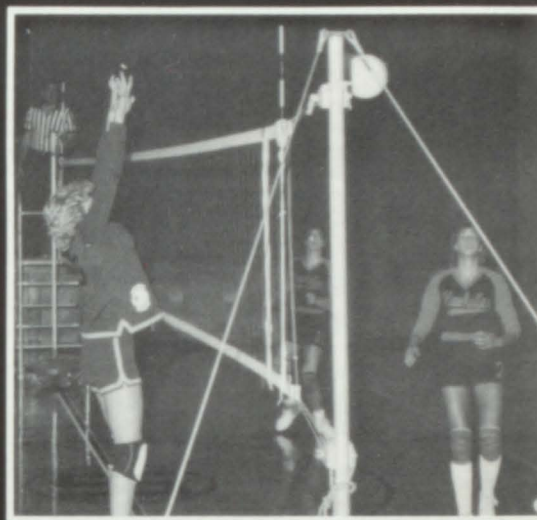
Softball—Making A Run For It

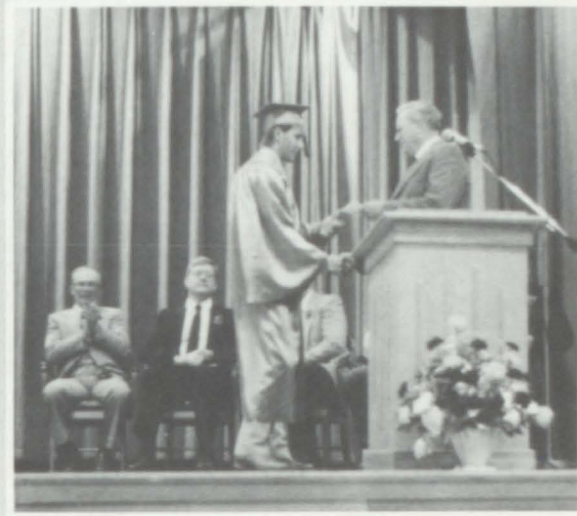
May 13, May 20: Baccalaureate, Commencement
